




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Role of MDC in deer management



- Set and enforce statewide harvest regulations,
- Administer Managed Deer Hunts on public properties,
- Monitor and manage disease,
- Issue special permits,
- Administer Hunter Education Program, and
- Act as technical advisor to communities on deer management.

Missouri Whitetails

- Fawns born in late spring (late May- June)
- Yearlings chased off at time of fawning
- Fawn near doe through next year
- Home ranges are about ½
 to 1½ mi²
- Rut peaks in mid-November



Suburban Deer Densities




Ecological carrying capacity = 20 deer/mi2

Goal population for suburban areas is somewhere in between these two capacities.



Social carrying capacity = ~40 deer/mi2





Suburban whitetails: Problems







- Landscape damage from browse & antler rub
- Deer-vehicle collisions
- Concern over tick-borne disease
- Bold and aggressive behavior
- Overbrowse of natural communities

Non-lethal solutions: Damage control

- ✓ Fencing
- ✓ Repellants
- √ Scare tactics
- ✓ Deer "resistant" plants
- ✓ Road warning devices
- ✓ Prohibit supplemental feeding (Frontenac has already done this)



Lethal solutions: Population control

Lethal solutions focus on long term population management. Does must be harvested for greatest reduction.

Options:

- ✓ Archery hunting
- ✓ Managed hunts
- √ Sharpshooting
- ✓ Trap & euthanasia



Suburban whitetails are a shared, abundant, renewable natural resource



Deer Management in St. Louis Metro Area

- ✓ Wildwood, unincorporated St. Louis County: Archery & firearms hunting with various restrictions
- ✓ Ballwin, Chesterfield, Clarkson Valley, Creve Coeur, Ladue, Hazelwood, Manchester, Maryland Heights, Sunset Hills: Archery &/or crossbow hunting with various restrictions
- ✓ Kirkwood, Sunset Hills, Ellisville, Wildwood, St. Louis County Parks, and unincorporated areas: Managed deer hunts on certain state owned properties
- ✓ Ellisville and Town & Country: Sharpshooting





Municipal ordinances permitting archery

Municipalities can require or restrict the use of archery equipment to craft a program which works for the community:

- ✓ Require hunting to occur from elevated stands.
- ✓ Restrict hunting to properties (or combined properties), of a certain acreage or larger.
- ✓ Require completion of an MDC approved bowhunter education course.
